The project was conceived from the existing site and also taking into account the preexisting buildings of the General Council. They present themselves more as isolated
buildings arranged in a public park than as an institutional building with a facade in
relation to the public space. The aim of the office extension project for the General
Council was to give this building back its full value/greatness by creating an entrance axis
aligned with the perspective of the château. This axis connects this new building to two
distinct courtyards. The first is surrounded by the buildings proposed in the competition,
while the second is an open courtyard providing access to the General Council buildings
and the stairway leading to the château of Alco. The building literally forms the new
entrance to the Alco site.

The choice of a compact building is linked to the different site and environmental constraints, but its formal simplicity is also intended to give a clear idea of the new entrance to the general Council. Its geometry, in relation to the sequence of courtyards and gardens, is opened up by a diagonal notch linked to the general access geometry from the tramway. The paved forecourt unfolds as a homogeneous, highly legible horizontal plane, passing beneath the building to become a courtyard that redirects the public towards the various buildings on the Alco site.
